1. Rationale Statement

The purpose of this proposal is to add scholarly rigor to the research requirement for the Post-Baccalaureate M.Ed. with Initial Licensure in English as a Second Language by substituting EDCI 590-Individual Research in place of EDCI 589-Applied Research.

2. Impact Statement

A similar change is being made in other Post-Baccalaureate Initial Licensure programs, so the impact is to create consistency across all programs. This change does not increase or reduce the number of credits in the program, so there is no need for a transition plan. There are no impacts on other departments or programs in the University.
