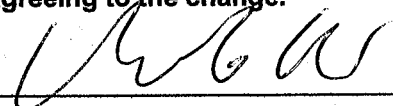

Rationale for the changes to the course numbers and course titles:

In their reports during the 10-year program review of 2010, the external German program reviewers¹ noted that the course numbering system is confusing for our students. Especially students in the second-year German 202 course who might be considering majoring or minoring in German, associate the next following language course, German 393, as "too hard" for them as the number suggests a big gap. Even more confused than the students currently enrolled in a UMW course are the freshmen, who have been advised by the Placement Test to take German 393 and/or 311.

Additionally, while both reviewers acknowledge the interesting content of our literature, culture, and advanced language courses, they criticize that the titles do not adequately reflect their interesting content. The reviewers note that the titles of our advanced-level courses sound boring and do not motivate students to take them. This is often the reason that students don't continue their studies at the advanced level. Especially, preconceived notions about literature ("I hate literature/poetry/plays...") let students decide against literature courses, which teach, in fact, much more cultural and social history than students would expect.

This is exemplified in the seminar German 485 "Representations of Death in German Culture" which makes ample use of German literature (including 18th century texts in their original German) and is considered "the best class" in the German program by students who claim to "hate literature."

The German program, therefore, wants to renumber and rename the 300 and 400 level German classes as indicated above. The changes shall take effect in the Fall semester of 2019.

Impact Statement: Change to German Minor

As a result of this program change there will be no changes in terms of library needs, space, budget, technology, or staffing. The changes are editorial and the only impact will be increased clarity in course offerings and, hopefully, increased enrollment.

Business German Minor

Department of Modern Languages and Literature

The Business German minor is an interdisciplinary program of study that combines courses in German language and culture with selected courses in business and/or economics. The Business German minor provides the student with a basic understanding of business and economics as well as the ability to communicate about them in German in a professional context. Students also include a three-credit internship as part of their minor programs. Approved German courses from study abroad programs may also be included among the electives of the Business German minor.
