Rationale:

We seek to add language to our requirements that will regularize the semester-by-semester approval of additional electives for the Social Justice minor. This will allow us to incorporate into our program relevant ongoing courses as well as special topics courses that have a strong emphasis on social justice. The change will greatly benefit our students who sometimes struggle to complete the Social Justice Minor due to the limited list of and irregular offering of existing electives.

Impact:

This change will not require additional resources in terms of library, space, budget, or technology. It will only result in more timely opportunities for students to complete the Social Justice Minor.
