# HONORS CITY AS TEXT<sup>TM</sup>: EXTENDED REMIX BY HANNAH HARRIS, CLASS OF 2023 AND CAT STUDENT COORDINATOR

UMW Honors' signature orientation experience, City as  $Text^{TM}$ , took on a different format this year. Instead of completing the preparation, walkabout, and presentation in a matter of days, students were enrolled in HONR 101, a one-credit course for the first eight weeks of the semester. The goals for early arrival were refocused; students did a campus scavenger hunt, took a trolley tour, and visited both the Fredericksburg Battlefield and Area Museum (FAM). They attended panels with Mary Washington faculty and students as well as several city officials on topics including local African American history and the problems and strengths of Fredericksburg. The HONR 101 class then met every Monday night to hear from campus experts on topics including urban planning and the built environment, conducting ethnographic research, equity, inclusion, and social justice. For the core walkabout experience, each group of students was assigned to a street in the Fredericksburg area and set off to explore it, accompanied by an upper-class student leader. The first-year students reflected on their experiences, sharing images, videos, and anecdotes, during a closing night of
